Awards. Two representatives will attend the Presentation of Awards on the evening of Thursday 22nd of June at the Oamaru Opera House. Keep an eye on the newspapers on the following Friday or Saturday to see how we went. I will ensure the results are published on our website as well.

Judy Waterston has been busy helping to introduce some young enthusiastic young men to the art of blacksmithing. Here are two young beginners at work, under Judy's watchful eye.

Once again we are grateful to the **Meridian Energy Waitaki Community Fund** which has come to our assistance by funding the creation of a sculpture by Matt King. The sculpture will be a very large metal sculpture of a "Haast's Eagle". It will be created in the summer of 2018.

This giant endemic eagle was the largest predator among New Zealand's prehistoric fauna. It is the largest, heaviest eagle species yet described, weighing up to 17.8 kg and had a wingspan up to 3 metres. Near-complete skeleton finds show that it had the body and wings of a giant eagle, legs and bill larger and stronger than the largest living vulture species, and feet and claws as big as a modern day tiger's.



On Sunday February 19th Lindsay Murray and his son Will (William) demonstrated "Knife Making". This is a real opportunity for smiths to see just what skills are required to be a good knife maker. I must admit the spark test was a real learning experience for me. (Will is photographed opposite.)

On Sunday April 23rd Dugal Armour, demonstrated his craft. The creative way Dugal work with copper was an inspiration to the few people who attended.

David Hamer, Judy and Mike made an excursion to Kuriheka Homestead to "dig" some more coke.

Tool Sharpening Days have attracted a few people each time. I am sure this source of income will grow as word spreads. Objects created in the forge are selling slowly as well. I am sure these sales will grow as we gain more skills.
